Y. M. C. A. TO PUBLISH COLLEGE DIRECTORY

Directory Will Contain Name, Home Address, Northfield Address, and Phone Number.

A directory of Carleton College will be published again this year by the Y. M. C. A. The directory will contain the name, home address, Northfield address, and Northfield telephone number of every student and teacher of the college.

The publication of the directory has been undertaken at the request of a large number of students and faculty members. Because of the fact that the residences of both the men and the women are scattered all over the vicinity of the college, it has been found almost impossible to locate students, and a directory is, therefore, in great demand.

Advertising for the directory will be solicited from the Northfield merchants, and the books will be sold for a small sum in order that every student and faculty member will secure one.

The first directory published by the Y. M. C. A. was issued last year, and a large number were sold. Because of the increased enrollment this year, it is expected that a larger number will be needed.

The material for the directory will be obtained at a chapel period this week. Each student will be asked to write on the slips provided, his name, home address, Northfield address, and Northfield telephone number. Harold Olson and Herbert Hess are in charge of the publication of the directory.

Upon leaving Carleton she taught for two years at Little Falls, and then accepted a position in the Duluth Normal school, but was unable to fill it because of her failing health.

TWO RUSSIANS TO STUDY AT CARLETON

Stroikoff boys, but it was a difficult problem, because relations between the United States and Russia did not permit a Russian's coming to America. Senator Knute Nelson, however, was able to get permission from the government permitting the Stroikoff brothers to come to America.

On October 2 the refugees sailed from Yokohama. On October 7 they landed at Vancouver. After spending one week as guests of Rev. Moncol, at his home in Holdingsford, Minnesota, they came to Northfield to resume their education at Carleton College.

Both Vladimir and Boris speak English well enough to get along, even though they have studied the English language but seven months. Besides speaking Russian and English, they speak German and French. They have graduated from the Gymnasia in Irkutsk, and have attended the University of Irkutsk five months.

They are enrolled as Juniors at Carleton college. Vladimir, who intends to be a physician, is taking Chemistry, English, and Mathematics. He is an accomplished cello player and has tried out for the college orchestra. Boris, who intends to be an engineer, is taking Physics, English, and Mathematics. He is said to be an excellent pianist.

The young Russians do not know when they will return to Russia. "It will be a long time," said Boris, "before the Russian Universities will reopen, and there is no need of our returning until they do."
