Gustavus closed its basketball season last Monday night by defeating Hamline in a one-sided game by a score of 52 to 28. The Gusties have clearly earned their state championship title this season. They lost only one conference game and have taken on all comers to demonstrate their superiority.

The hectic race in the Big Ten conference is finally over and Indiana and Purdue are tied for first and second places with Northwestern and Wisconsin tied for third and fourth places. Michigan ran fifth this season, and Minnesota came in ninth.

Sophomores hold the limelight this year in the high scoring columns in Big Ten circles. Stretch Murphy of Purdue garnered the most points of any individual in the conference this season and another sophomore by the name of McCracken of Indiana was not far behind. Walter of Northwestern and Foster of Wisconsin are two other men of first-year varsity competition who were in the limelight the whole season. All four of these men are centers and the battles they put up against one another when two of them met was a sight for sore eyes.

Only one veteran in the conference could keep in the running with these four young upstarts and he is the ever reliable Benny Oosterbaan, an All-American end in the fall, an All-Conference forward in the winter and a baseball player of American League calibre in the spring. In between times he attends school at Ann Arbor, Michigan.

The University of Pittsburgh has had quite a time in athletics this year. They defeated all comers in regular scheduled games in football last fall and finally met defeat by a score of 7-6 on the Pacific coast to Leland Stanford. Then they put a basketball team on the floor that came west and defeated four Big Ten teams in five nights, and these teams were not set-ups. To be exact, they played Michigan at Ann Arbor on a Friday night, Chicago in the Machine-gun city on Saturday evening, Wisconsin at Madison on Monday night and wound up by trimming Iowa at Iowa City the next night. When their basketball season closed they had won twenty-one games and they would have won more but that was all they played.

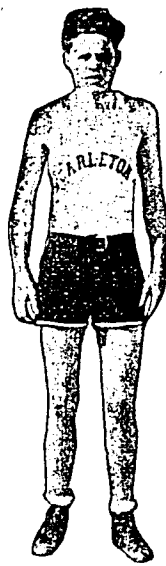

Election Follows Three Year Term on Squad.

Behlmer Carisch of River Falls, Wisconsin, was elected to captain the Carleton basketball squad through the 1928-29 season at a meeting of this year's letter men last Friday noon.

The men who took part in the election are Captain Setterquist, Simso, and Williams, all of whom have finished their basketball careers here at Carleton; Grove and Helming, who have another year of varsity play ahead of them; Nicholson, who has two years of activity in Sayles-Hill ahead of him; and Carisch.

Before coming to Carleton, Carisch played with the championship River Falls high school team. In his freshman year here, Carisch played forward on the frosh basketball team and the following year stepped into a regular position at forward on the varsity. He has held down this position for two years and has delivered a fast and hard brand of basketball which has made him a threat to opponents in every game. His outstanding performance this season was in the Cornell game at Mount Vernon in which he scored fifteen points to enable Carleton to be the first to defeat Cornell on their home floor in several years.

Besides his activities on the basketball court, Carisch has been on the football squad for two years and shows his wares at a quarterback position.
