

Wood's School Formally Joins Macalester

Displaced Person Joins Personnel Office Staff

New on the staff of the Personnel office is Mrs. Jadwiga Shemschushnikow. She and her husband came to the United States from Germany on June 27 of this year as displaced persons. Mrs. Shemschushnikow found her job at Macalester through the placement services of the International Institute and she plans to continue her work here while her husband completes an engineering course at the U. of M.

"Everything is so strange here," says Mrs. Shemschushnikow. "The two things that strike me as being different from those of Germany are the food and the houses. In Germany we had no choice of food and the buildings were so bombed out that there was seldom only one family to a house."

Mr. and Mrs. Shemschushnikow plan to remain in the United States and become citizens.

Students of the Miss Wood's Kindergarten-Primary Training School, now a part of Macalester, were guests at a tea given in their honor by Miss Stevens, principal of the school, the afternoon of Sept. 13. Other guests included Dr. C. J. Turck and Miss Margaret Doty.

An assembly at which the second year students of the school presented the new girls with corsages was held Sept. 15. A picnic in the backyard of the Stella Wood Hall concluded the orientation activities.

One hundred-eighty girls are enrolled in the school, 86 second year and 94 first year students. Nineteen of these are former Macalester students.

The first year class is divided into three groups. Half of the girls are students teaching at various neighborhood houses and one private school in the Twin Cities. Another group observes at Northeast Neighborhood House, Mpls., which is the demonstration kindergarten. The other is the orientation group which visits a kindergarten and primary classes of the public schools two mornings a week. On each of the other three mornings it takes an industrial excursion, a nature

excursion, and two classes in maternal and child care and art appreciation. At the end of nine weeks these groups are rotated.

The three groups attend classes such as Basic Science, Creative Art, History of Education, Childhood Psychology, and Social Studies in the afternoon.

The second year students, besides attending regular classes, practice teach in city schools, teaching one semester in kindergarten and the other in the primary grades.
